After a four-year run in Winston-Salem, the NSMA Awards visit Greensboro for the first time, expanding the organization's reach further into the Piedmont Triad. The Gate City, or "Tournament Town" as Greensboro calls itself is the third North Carolina city to host the Awards Weekend and National Convention. The old National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association signature event began 65 years ago, and 45 miles down the road, in Salisbury. For close to six decades every spring and summer, Salisbury raised a toast to salute the top sportswriter and sportscaster from each of the fifty states. The annual celebration, which until 2016 was called the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association, got off the ground because of the dream of a Salisbury restaurant owner and grew legs because of the vision of a Salisbury doctor.

Pete DiMizio promoted boxing matches around the Piedmont area of North Carolina by hobby and ran an Italian restaurant by way of making a living. At one point in the early 'fifties, DiMizio imported an Italian chef to dazzle his patrons' taste buds but soon figured out that his wife, Becky, cooked a better pizza than the chef.

DiMizio also figured it behooved his boxing promotions to friend up with sportswriters and sportscasters in the area. In exchange for free food, DiMizio got the free publicity his boxing matches so desperately needed.

One thing led to another and DiMizio was hosting an annual recognition banquet at his restaurant and the guests of honor were the best writers and casters in North Carolina. Then he founded the idea to expand and go national.

That was in 1958. The first scheduled gathering of national winners never got off the ground and was cancelled in 1959. Then DiMizio died of cancer and left the NSSA dream to his wife, who had neither the time nor financial wherewithal to fulfill her husband's wishes.

In stepped the Salisbury-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce, various regional civic clubs and one Dr. Ed McKenzie.

To get the organization off the ground, all parties agreed that a sum of \$12,000 was needed. The total was more than the entire Chamber of Commerce budget. But McKenzie believed it could be raised, so he went about selling tickets to the first banquet at \$100 a plate. That was in 1960. By today's value, which would be the equivalent of asking for \$823 per plate.

McKenzie personally knocked on the door of every business and friend in the Salisbury area. Before long, his list of donors reached 113 --- everyone alphabetically from Howard Aiken of Miller Brewing Co. to Bill Younts of Rowan Dairy -and the Chamber of Commerce was willing to kick in the remaining \$700.

McKenzie next believed it was important for the organization to get the blessing and endorsement of the state of North Carolina, and he went to work on the governor, Luther Hodges.

"He drove to Raleigh three or four times to see the governor," Nancy, his wife, once told the *Salisbury Post.* "The governor did not want to endorse a flop, the winners had to be assured the banquet was not a gimmick. Ed pulled a lovely finesse to get them all here."

McKenzie believed the organization would gain legitimacy only if the first two national winners attended the event. So, he boarded a train for New York and extended a personal invitation to sportscaster Lindsey Nelson and sportswriter Red Smith.

McKenzie talked his way into Nelson's office at NBC and Nelson agreed to come. Smith was not so easy to get. On assignment, Smith was not expected back in New York for eight weeks. McKenzie sneaked past a receptionist at the New York Herald-Tribune and found an audience with Smith's editor. Six long-distance calls later and McKenzie was assured that Smith would be in Salisbury to be honored.

The inaugural event was smashing. Governor Hodges presented awards to Nelson and Smith. Ms. North Carolina, Judi Klipfel of Asheboro, presented plaques to the thirty-eight state winners who attended. Earl Ruth, the Catawba College athletics director, served as the host.

Nelson said his acceptance speech would be brief.

"I have never tried to make a speech since a woman sent me a telegram saying my speaking ability was the oratorical equal of a blocked punt," Nelson said.

Smith spoke as he wrote . . . with great prose.

"The very notion of honoring such a disreputable group as ours is utterly audacious," Smith said. "This is the most gracious and most generous thing that has ever been done for our rather seedy group." Morr

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Three years into the organization's existence, the board of directors realized it did not have a charter. Upon drawing up the official papers for the organization, the board encountered a delicate problem: Would the organization be called the



Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association or the Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association?

To settle the matter, the group decided on a coin flip between Nelson, representing the casters, and Melvin Durslag of the *Los Angeles Examiner*, representing the writers. Nelson won and the organization has ever since gone by Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association.

That same board also established a Hall of Fame and the lone inductee in 1962 was Grantland Rice, long considered the greatest writer of sports.

Of the Hall of Fame, Durslag wrote: "It is probably easier to walk out of the Louvre with the Mona Lisa than it is to be admitted to this hall of fame." Durslag was inducted into the NSSA Hall of Fame in 1995.

In 1963, McKenzie asked Nelson as a special favor to be the featured speaker at the Spencer High School athletic awards banquet. Nelson agreed but getting to Spencer on time for the banquet was going to be difficult.

Nelson completed the play-by-play announcing of the first three innings of a New York Mets spring training game in Florida, slipped out of the press box and drove seventy-five miles to the airport to fly to Charlotte. McKenzie and the sheriff of Rowan County met Nelson at the Charlotte airport and rode in the sheriff's car to Spencer.

Nelson arrived after dinner had been served and the tables cleared. He then spoke for 45 minutes, wowing the crowd with impersonations of Mets' manager Casey Stengel. Then he concluded with a reading of Rudyard Kipling's poem "lf."

Since that reading, NSSA several years later dedicated its Hall of Fame to youth. For several years, state winners and Hall of Fame inductees were presented copies of Kipling's poem, which for many years also appeared in the annual banquet program.

The list of honored guests over the years has included many from the world of sports and beyond. Among those who visited Salisbury for the NSSA awards weekend were Yogi Berra, Terry Bradshaw, Jerry Clower, John Elway, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Whitey Ford, Roman Gabriel, Andy Griffith, Lewis Grizzard, Bob Hope, Larry King, Bobby Knight, Bowie Kuhn, Mickey Mantle, Billy Martin, Curly Neal, Jesse Owens, Arnold Palmer, Richard Petty, Wilma Rudolph, Bart Starr, Lynn Swann, Ted Turner, Gene Upshaw, Jim Valvano, Flip Wilson, John Wooden and Cale Yarborough.

In June of 2017, the NSMA moved its rebranded Awards Weekend and National Convention to Winston-Salem. The organization's headquarters followed suit that October. And now, after a seven-year run in Winston-Salem, the NSMA is expanding its North Carolina footprint to Greensboro.

Called Tournament Town, Greensboro has hosted more Atlantic Coast Conference men's and women's basketball tournaments than any other city. And until last May, the ACC headquarters were located just down the street from Grandover Resort.

Greensboro Coliseum (capacity 22,000) is the longtime host to the ACC Tournaments. Just outside the Coliseum is the Greensboro Aquatic Center, home to many national and top-level college swimming and diving championships. Also adjacent to the Coliseum is Novant Health Fieldhouse, home to the NBA G-League's Greensboro Swarm.

In addition, Sedgefield Country Club is home to the PGA's Wyndham Championship, the Pittsburg Pirates High-A affiliate, the Greensboro Grasshoppers play at First National Bank Field. And Greensboro's college teams – UNC Greensboro, North Carolina A&T, Bennett College, Guilford College, and Greensboro College – provide sports entertainment during the school year.

There are also plenty of year-round opportunities for youth sports in and around Greensboro, with several city and private parks and recreation centers throughout the area.

And now you can add the NSMA's Awards Weekend & National Convention to the calendar. Though we opened in 1959, the excitement remains the same. We may be 65 years old, but we're just getting started.

Bear Bryant COACH OF THE YEAR AWARD

Mike Norvell of Florida State was voted the winner of this year's Paul "Bear" Bryant College Football Coach of the Year Award. The Seminoles finished the 2023 regular season perfect at 13-0, before Georgia beat them in the Orange Bowl.

For 38 years, the Houston, Texas chapter of the American Heart Association has presented the Bryant Award as a salute to those college football coaches who have reached the same high standard of excellence as Coach Bryant did.

NSMA members serve as the voting body for the Bryant Award. Members are emailed a ballot link at the end of the College Football Playoff National Championship Game. The award is presented on stage in Houston two nights later.

The Heart Association also presents a Lifetime Achievement Award to a former coach who excelled at his craft. Lloyd Carr of Michigan was the 2024 winner.

Serving as the voting body for the award is a small way for the NSMA to help the AHA fight heart disease and stroke.

Rowe is widely-recognized for her versatility and excellence as a reporter over more than 20 years at ESPN. Her high-profile events include ABC Saturday Night Football, Big Monday men's college basketball, NCAA Women's Final Four, and the College World Series, as well as the WNBA. A 2023 recipient of the Curt Gowdy Award from the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, Rowe also won the 2022 Sports Emmy for Outstanding Personality/Reporter. The Utah native is a graduate of the University of Utah.

Wilcox recently finished a two-and-a-half-year stint at the Memphis Commercial-Appeal, where he won an Associated Press Sports Editors First-Place Award for breaking news. Wilcox had previous stops at The Augusta Chronicle and Niagara Gazette. The Cincinnati native is a graduate of the University of Ohio.

"Why We Love Baseball" was a New York Times bestseller and winner of the CASEY Award for Best Baseball Book (2023). The seventh book by NSMA's 2012 National Sportswriter of the Year, it tells of both well-known and lesser-known moments that can educate even the most-ardent baseball fan. In its review, the Wall Street Journal said, "Mr. Posnanski is a bit like the guy telling baseball stories at a bar—if that guy is clever, funny, not averse to hyperbole, sentiment or numerology, willing to go to great lengths to track down a fact and possessed of a way with words..."



Peter Gilbert

Peter Gilbert has had a distinguished career in producing, directing, and photographing documentaries, feature films, commercials, and music videos. He is one of the filmmakers who made *Hoop Dreams*, serving as a Producer and Director of Photography. The film won numerous awards including The Sundance Film Festival Audience Award, Producers Guild of America, Independent Spirit Award, and The Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Award for Journalism. *Hoop Dreams* was on 100+ top ten lists for 1994.

Also, with Kartemquin Films he co-directed *At the Death House Door*, which premiered at South by Southwest in 2008, and won awards at other festivals, including the inspiration award at Full Frame. It was short-listed for the Academy Award. It aired on the Independent Film Channel in May of 2008.

In 2004, he produced and directed, *With All Deliberate Speed*, the first work in the new series "Discovery Docs," for the Discovery Network. The nationally released film portrays the drama of the monumental Brown V. Board Supreme Court decision that helped change the racial fabric of our country in 1954. *With All Deliberate Speed* was nominated for a Prime Time Emmy for Distinguished Work in Non-Fiction Film.

Recently, Gilbert and his partner HOF NBA player Chris Webber, Co-Executive Produced *Charm City* for Big Mouth Productions. With Forager Films and Webber, Gilbert has Produced and EP'd 15 independent films that played at major festivals worldwide including Sundance, SXSW, Tribeca and Berlin. All have sold and played on major streaming platforms or released theatrically.

His animated short, 5 Minutes, currently is on the festival circuit.

Gilbert has a long career in creating branded content and commercials for Nike, Reebok, Adidas, Giant Bicycles, Major League Baseball and the NBA and more.

He has been a nominated three times for Best Director by the DGA (with 1 win) and is a 10-time Emmy nominee (1 win). He is also a winner of the Sundance Film Festival award for best cinematography.

Gilbert served on the board of Kartemquin Films and is a board member emeritus for the organization. He also served on The Executive Committee of the Documentary Branch for AMPAS. He is a DGA, WGA, IA, AMPAS, and ATAS member.

In addition, Gilbert is a Professor of Practice in the MFA Documentary Film Program at Wake Forest University in Winston Salem, NC. He resides in Chicago, his filmmaking home.

Steve James is a Chicago-based filmmaker whose previous work includes Academy Award nominated films *Hoop Dreams* and *Abacaus*. Other award-winning work includes *Stevie*, *The Interrupters*, *and Life Itself*. James's sports-themed works for ESPN's Peabody Award-winning series, "30 for 30" include *No Crossover: The Trial of Allen Iverson and The Luckiest Guy in the World*, which IndieWire named one of the best documentaries of 2023. James also directed Head Games, a film on the C.T.E. crisis in contact sports.

ABOUT THE ROONE ARLEDGE AWARD - The Roone Arledge Award for Innovation was begun in 2015 as a way to honor innovators in sports media, either individuals or entities.

Roone Arledge -- the posthumous first winner of the award -- was the legendary president of ABC Sports and ABC News, who during his career, changed the face of sports television. Arledge not only was the mastermind behind such shows as Monday Night Football and Wide World of Sports, he was also responsible for a slew of production values -- slow-motion, instant replay, freeze-frame, hand-held cameras, and on-field microphone placements -- that we take for granted today.

Arledge also hired some of television's most influential broadcasters. In sports, they included NSMA Hall of Famers Howard Cosell, Frank Gifford, and Jim McKay.

The Arledge Award for Innovation is presented annually during the NSMA's Awards Weekend.

Barnes has stayed busy at "The U," interning on University of Miami Television's NewsVision and SportsDesk shows, while also serving as a Creative Video Intern with Hurricanes' Athletics. In addition to those and several other internships as a student, Barnes has also worked for seven years as a freelance videographer.

Basketball journalist and college lecturer A. Sherrod Blakely, said of Barnes on LinkedIn, "As a journalist/educator, every now and then your path crosses with someone who is more than just talented. They have industry-changing gifts that can be honed, not taught. This young man, Derryl Barnes Jr., is one of those people. 





VOTING PROCESS

NSMA members in each state nominate up to three people for state and national awards from mid-October through mid-November. The names of the top two state vote-getters and top 10 national votegetters (plus ties) appear on the final ballot. If a minimum of two candidates fail to earn a minimum number of nomination votes, that category requires a write-in vote on the final ballot. National Board members supply the 10 Hall of Fame finalists.

Final ballot voting is conducted throughout the month of December. In the event of ties, a tiebreaker vote is conducted. If there is still a tie after the tiebreaker vote, that contest is declared a tie and the candidates are declared co-winners.

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ANDREA KREMER

Andrea Kremer is one of the most accomplished and widely respected journalists in the industry today. In 2018, she was honored by the Pro Football Hall of Fame as the recipient of the Pete Rozelle Radio-Television Award, which recognizes "long-time exceptional contributions to radio and television in professional football." Kremer became the first fulltime female NFL game analyst, partnering with Hannah Storm to form the first female commentating team for Amazon Prime Video's "Thursday Night Football" package.



In 2011, she was named one of the 10 greatest female sportscasters of all time. TV Guide said Kremer is "among

TV's best sports correspondents of either sex," and her work is "distinguished by her eagerness to calmly ask tough questions and her refusal to pursue the same old story." She has received numerous awards and accolades, including eight Emmys, multiple Gracies, and a Peabody. She was the first inductee into the Cynopsis Sports Hall of Fame in recognition of her many contributions to journalism. In 2005, Kremer received a PRISM Award for her ESPN story on Dexter Manley and in 2017 she was inducted into the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame. In 2020, Kremer received the Mary Garber Pioneer Award, the highest honor bestowed by the Association of Women in Sports Media (AWSM).

Kremer is currently Chief Correspondent for the NFL Network. She led the network's coverage and in-depth reporting on health and safety, a critical issue facing professional sports. She has chronicled All Pro defensive back Darrelle Revis' year-long comeback from a devastating ACL injury for "A Football Life," she interviewed Johnny Jolly in prison for drug abuse and then a year later as he returned to the Green Bay Packers' starting lineup, and also got wide receiver Laurent Robinson to open up about how his life changed after suffering four concussions in four months.

Kremer added a podcast to her broadcast portfolio in 2021 as the host of iHeart's "NFL Films: Tales From the Vault." This weekly podcast dives deep into NFL history featuring exclusive interviews between the late NFL Films founder Steve Sabol and some of the most iconic figures in the game.

Kremer was also a correspondent for HBO's "Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel." For 16 years, she contributed a host of critically acclaimed profiles and features to the Emmy-Award winning newsmagazine show. Her 2016 investigation into sexual assault in Bikram Yoga was called one of the Ten Most Shocking Stories of the Year by Metro US. Among the most memorable interviews she has done at HBO include compelling one-on-ones with Robert Kraft, Kobe Bryant, Urban Meyer, Pete Carroll, Phil Jackson, Mark Davis, Barret Robbins, DeMaurice Smith, Bill Parcells, Jim and John Harbaugh as well as track and field star Caster Semenya. Her story on the abuse of the drug Toradol helped earn Real Sports its first Peabody Award in 2012.

In 2014, Kremer helped launch "WE NEED TO TALK," the first ever all-female nationally televised weekly sports show on CBS Sports Network. Airing in prime time, the show features a rotating group of female panelists discussing all the hot topics and the latest news from across the sports landscape. After its inaugural season, the show won a Gracie Grand Award for On Air Talent: Sports Program.

In addition to her current TV work, Kremer teaches a course of her own design, "The Art of





ROGER KAHN

Roger Kahn, was often called the dean of American sports writers and the best baseball writer in the country. He earned this praise as a newspaper reporter, magazine writer, columnist, and author for more than 50 years. Growing up in Brooklyn, he developed a deep passion for the Dodgers, eventually joining the New York Herald Tribune in 1948 as a copyboy, and by 1952, he was living his dream; he became the newspaper's star sports reporter by covering the Dodgers.



Transitioning to Newsweek magazine in 1956 as sports editor and later serving as editor at large for The Saturday

Evening Post from 1963 to 1969, Kahn expanded his reach. He contributed a monthly column to Esquire magazine for ten years, winning the E.P. Dutton prize five times. Beyond sports, Kahn also covered fiction and nonfiction, exploring politics, social issues, and racial inequality. His heartfelt writings on Jackie Robinson's groundbreaking entry into major league baseball in 1947 skyrocketed his following.

At that point in his career, Kahn realized his passion and hard work were admired; he used this to his advantage, writing 17 nonfiction books, two novels, and countless articles in such national publications as Esquire, Sports Illustrated, Time, and The Saturday Evening Post. Recognized for his thoughtful commentary, Kahn's writings captivate readers by dissecting the greatness and flaws of sports figures.

"Roger Kahn is one of the most eloquent sportswriters ever," said John Mark Eberhart in the Kansas City Star. "All his pieces make for great reading as they address the greatness and shortcomings of everyone from Jack Dempsey to the late, great, obnoxious Yankees manager, Billy Martin."

In 1972 Roger Kahn became a national sensation after publishing his book The Boys of Summer. The book became a popular bestseller, and other authors used it hundreds of times each baseball season. Through March of 2024, The Boys of Summer had sold over 300 million copies. In addition to memorable meetings with Hall of Famers Jackie Robinson, Pee Wee Reese, and Duke Snider, as well as other notable Brooklyn Dodgers from the 1950s, the book traces Kahn's early years as a sports reporter in New York City. According to a review, the book captured the attention of readers. "It's not simply another story about a youngster who grows to love baseball or baseball in general, but a book about pain and defeat and endurance, about how men, anywhere, must live."

Kahn taught writing at various colleges and lectured at such universities as Yale, Princeton, and Columbia. In 2004, he was appointed the Ottaway Professor of Journalism at SUNY New Paltz. He emphasized the importance of mentorship in journalism and shared insights from his career. While at SUNY New Paltz, he also taught a class called "Beyond the Boys of Summer," where he discussed his approach to writing. Kahn was honored in 2006 by being inducted into the National Jewish Sports Hall of Fame, and Baseball Commissioner Bud Selig praised him as an "icon of our game."

Reflecting on his career, Kahn expressed his desire to pass his journalism knowledge to the next generation. Roger Kahn passed away on February 6, 2020, at 92.



TIM McCARVER

Tim McCarver proved as versatile and dependable during his Hall of Fame broadcasting career as he did during his MLB career that spanned parts of four decades. A twotime All-Star catcher who was part of two World Series championship teams, McCarver's broadcasting career lasted more than 30 years.

He was known as a shrewd and literate analyst, who could predict what was about to happen on the field. While sometimes a play-by-play announcer, McCarver was most often a color commentator, a role for which his talents were better suited.



His on-air career began in Philadelphia in 1980, moved to the Mets' booth, and then to his national appearances on four different networks, while also calling games for the Yankees and the Giants.

McCarver was a respected independent voice in the booth, not afraid to criticize teams for which he worked. Some thought that cost him his job with the Mets in 1999, after 16 seasons broadcasting their games.

McCarver called a total of 24 World Series. For the first, on ABC in 1985, he was a replacement for another NSMA Hall of Famer, Howard Cosell.

As with many of baseball's best broadcasters, McCarver was a catcher. The thinking goes that because a catcher plays such a large part in all facets of the game, that it's easier for one to impart that knowledge on a broadcast. When you mixed that with his intelligence, communication skills, and sense of humor, you had a Hall of Fame broadcaster.

When you think of McCarver as a ballplayer, the two words that come to mind are solid and dependable. Most of his career, which stretched from 1959 to 1980, was spent with two teams, the Cardinals and the Phillies. His career batting average of .271 was among the better averages for catchers at that time. But he was known better for his handling of pitchers, including two of the game's all-time best, Bob Gibson and Steve Carlton.

In 1966, McCarver did something no catcher had done before. He led the league in triples with 13. He made his first All-Star team that season, and made his second in 1967, when he hit .295 and with a career-high 14 home runs and 69 runs batted. He finished second behind teammate Orlando Cepeda in voting for the National League's Most Valuable Player award. With McCarver in the lineup, the Cardinals won three pennants and two World Series (1964, 1967). In the '64 series over the Yankees, he hit safely in all seven games, batting .478 and hitting a 10th-inning three-run homer to win Game 5. Though he didn't hit well in the '67 Series win over Boston, he hit .333 in the '68 Series against Detroit. Ironically, the Cardinals won in '67, but lost in '68. Both Series went 7 games.

As a player, McCarver is probably best known as the battery mate of choice for two of the greatest pitchers in big-league history, Bob Gibson and Steve Carlton. Both were on the Cardinals in the 1960s, and McCarver was behind the plate for Gibson's 1968 season, in which his earned run average was a minuscule 1.12, the lowest for any pitcher in more than century.

Carlton joined the Cardinals in 1965, and McCarver caught his first two all-star seasons,

JAYSON STARK

Jayson Stark grew up in Philadelphia dreaming of becoming a sportswriter. He has worked all of his adult life making that dream a reality.

Jayson has been a senior writer for The Athletic since 2018. Before joining The Athletic, he covered baseball for ESPN for 17 years and at the Philadelphia Inquirer for the previous 21 years. He also worked at the Providence Journal for five years following his graduation from Syracuse University. He has been a longtime presence on TV as well, most recently as an insider for MLB Network.



Jayson was the 2019 winner of the BBWAA's Career Excellence Award and was honored that summer at the Baseball Hall of Fame.

In his profile on the Hall of Fame's website, he was described as "a curator for all things weird, wacky, unique, statistically inclined and historically rare in the game." His popular "Weird and Wild" column at The Athletic is a regular collection of notes, quotes, numbers, oddities and laughs.

In his previous stops at ESPN.com and the Philadelphia Inquirer, he was the creator and author of the nationally syndicated "Baseball Week in Review" column, where he first began looking at baseball in the irreverent style for which he is so well known.

While working at the Inquirer, Jayson was twice named as the NSMA's Pennsylvania Sportswriter of the Year. He was a 2019 inductee into the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame and was honored by the Philadelphia Jewish Sports Hall of Fame in 2017. He was honored in 2010 by Penn State's Foster Conference for Distinguished Writers for his books and other work. He also appeared in the 2014 film, "Million Dollar Arm," starring Jon Hamm.

Jayson is the author of three books, "Wild Pitches: Rumblings, Grumblings and Reflections on the Game I Love" (Triumph Books, 2014), "The Stark Truth: The Most Overrated and Underrated Players in Baseball History" (Triumph Books, 2006) and "Worth The Wait: Tales of the 2008 Phillies" (Triumph Books, 2009). And in 2018, Topps issued an actual Jayson Stark baseball card.

Jayson lives in suburban Philadelphia with his wife, Lisa. They have three children: Steven, Jessica and Hali.

JOE BUCK

In March 2022, ESPN signed play-by-play commentator Joe Buck, along with Troy Aikman, to a multi-year deal, making him the new play-by-play announcer of Monday Night Football.

Buck and Aikman are the NFL's longest broadcasting tandem in history, beginning their partnership in 2002 as a three-man booth with analyst Cris Collinsworth, before becoming a duo in 2005. Over their 22 seasons together, they have called more than 300 regular-season games, more than 40 playoff matchups, 18 NFC Championships and Super Bowls XXXIX, XLII, XLV, XLVIII, LI and LIV. Both



have been nominated for Sports Emmy Awards multiple times, with Buck winning a recordtying eight times for play-by-play. In December 2022, Buck was inducted into the Sports Broadcasting Hall of Fame.

During the season, Aikman and Buck work alongside Lisa Salters, Monday Night Football's longest-tenured sideline reporter. In May 2023, at the 44th Annual Sports Emmy Awards, Monday Night Football won a Sports Emmy for 'Outstanding Live Sports Series' for the MNF's 2023 season – the trio's first year together.

At a mere 25 years old, Buck became a household voice for NFL fans. He made his NFL debut during the 1994-95 season, calling a full slate of games for FOX Sports, a role he has continued each subsequent year. As he enters his 29th consecutive season calling NFL games, Buck will become the eighth play-by-play voice of Monday Night Football. He has also continued a family legacy, as he and his dad, Jack, are the only father-son duo to both call network Super Bowls and be recognized with the Pete Rozelle Radio-Television Award. Jack Buck also had significant history with Monday Night Football, calling play-by-play on the national radio broadcast from 1978-1984 and 1987-1995.

Outside of the NFL, Joe Buck's career accomplishments are vast and impressive, calling 24 World Series, 22 MLB All-Star games, five of golf's U.S. Opens, and having hosted his own studio shows. Buck has been named the National Sports Media Association's National Sportscaster of the Year four times, including three years in a row (2002-04, 2006).

Buck was a local radio and television announcer for the St. Louis Cardinals from 1991 to 2007. His broadcasting career began in 1989, while he was an undergraduate at Indiana University. That year he called play-by-play for the Louisville Redbirds of the American Association, a minor-league affiliate of the Cardinals, and was a reporter for ESPN's coverage of the Triple-A All-Star Game. Buck also hosted a talk show for HBO Sports, "Joe Buck Live," in 2009, and hosted "Undeniable with Joe Buck" on DirecTV's Audience Network.

Joe is the son of late broadcasting legend Jack Buck, whose career spanned parts of six decades. The Bucks become the third parent-child duo to become NSMA Hall of Famers, joining the Jenkinses (Dan, Sally) and the Carays (Harry, Skip).

Active in many national and local charities, he hosts The Joe Buck Classic golf tournament, which benefits St. Louis Children's Hospital and helps fund its imaging center. Since it began in 2000, the annual event has raised more than \$5 million. Buck also works closely with the Parkinson's Foundation, Mathews-Dickey Boys' & Girls' Club and City of Hope.

Buck is married to fellow ESPN reporter, Michelle Beisner-Buck. He has four kids; Natalie, Trudy, Wyatt and Blake.

the Interview," in the Department of Journalism at Boston University's College of Communication. In 2015, she was appointed the Andrew R. Lack Fellow at Boston University. She has also guest lectured at several leading institutions including Stanford University and the University of Pennsylvania.

A versatile reporter, Kremer has worked close to 30 Super Bowls, covered the NBA Finals and All-Star Games, Major League Baseball's All-Star Game and League Championship Series, college football bowl games, Stanley Cup Playoffs and Finals, NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, U.S. Olympic basketball trials, and the PGA Championship.

1968 and 1969; after that, they followed each other.

McCarver was traded to the Phils in 1970, to the Expos in 1972, back to the Cardinals in 1973, and to the Red Sox in 1974. When Boston released him the next season, the Phillies brought him back and made him Carlton's personal catcher. From 1976 to 1979, Carlton won 77 games, the second of his four Cy Young Awards, and the Phillies reached the postseason three times.

McCarver was released after the 1979 season and began his broadcasting career the next year, but the Phillies brought him back in October 1980 so that he could join the short list of big leaguers who played in four separate decades. He appeared in six games; had one hit, a double; and occasionally handled two jobs at once, conducting television interviews in his Phillies uniform.

McCarver also appeared on broadcasts outside of the baseball booth. He hosted the "Tim McCarver Show" on radio and television for several years, interviewing sports celebrities and others. He was a co-host for CBS' broadcast of the 1992 Winter Olympics. In addition, he co-authored six books, appeared in several movies, sang for an album, and was such a good bridge player, the New York Times talked about him in its bridge column.

The capstone to McCarver's career came in 2012, when he received the Ford C. Frick Award, essentially a lifetime achievement citation presented annually to a broadcaster by the National Baseball Hall of Fame for "major contributions to baseball."

Four years later, he was inducted into the Sports Broadcasting Hall of Fame.

McCarver died in February of 2023 in his hometown of Memphis. He left behind two daughters, Kelly and Kathy, and two grandchildren.


2023-24 College Basketball Coach Of The Year BIG HOUSE GAINES AWARD

KEVIN KEATTS DIVISION I • NC STATE

Kevin Keatts' seventh season as head men's basketball coach at NC State turned out to be his team's best.

After a challenging 17-14 regular season, the Wolfpack ran off five wins in five days to capture the ACC Tournament championship. And the team stayed hot, winning four straight NCAA Tournament games before losing in the national semifinals to Purdue.

Keatts has an overall record of 139-94 and has guided NC State to a .500 or better record in ACC play in five of his seven seasons. He is just the second coach in the last 40 years to lead NC State to four consecutive seasons of .500 or better play in the ACC.



The Pack's 2023-24 season saw NC State finish with a 26-15 record as NC State returned to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight season.

It marked the fifth time in seven seasons that Keatts' teams finished with 20 or more wins.

Keatts came to NC State after three seasons as head coach of UNC-Wilmington. With the Seahawks, Keatts complied a record of 72-28 (.720) and a 41-13 (.759) mark in Colonial Athletic Association play, leading the team to the postseason in each of his three years.

A native of Lynchburg, Va., he guided the Seahawks to CAA regular season titles all three years in Wilmington and was named CAA Coach of the Year in 2015 and 2016. He was the first coach in conference history to earn Coach of the Year accolades in back-to-back seasons.

He came to UNC-Wilmington after three seasons as an assistant coach on Pitino's staff at Louisville and was elevated to associate head coach in January of 2014.

While on staff at Louisville, Keatts and the Cardinals went 96-21 (.821) and Keatts helped the Cardinals compile two straight top-10 recruiting classes en route to a pair of Big East Conference championships and NCAA Final Four appearances in 2012 and 2013.

Prior to arriving at Louisville, Keatts served as the head coach at Hargrave Military Academy in Chatham, Va. In 10 seasons with two separate stints at Hargrave (1999-2001, 2003-2011), he compiled a 263-17 record with two national prep championships (2004, 2008), three runner-up finishes (2005, 2006, 2009) and two other appearances among the final four

prep teams (2007, 2010).

Keatts has also had stops as an assistant coach at Marshall and Southwestern Michigan College. He worked for two seasons at Marshall from 2001-03 and assisted with the program at Southwestern Michigan in Dowagiac, Mich., during the 1996-97 campaign.

He was a two-sport standout in football and basketball at Heritage High School in Lynchburg, Va., and went on to play four seasons of basketball as a point guard at Ferrum (Va.) College. He later earned his Bachelor's Degree while at Marshall.

Keatts and his wife Georgette, have two sons, K.J. and Kaden.





2023-24 College Basketball Coach Of The Year BIG HOUSE GAINES AWARD

ALFRED JORDAN DIVISION II – CLARK ATLANTA

After going 8-20 in his first season at Clark Atlanta, Jordan's second team showed marked improvement. The Division II Gaines Award winner led the Panthers to a 22-5 record during the regular season, with the five losses coming by a total of 11 points. Clark Atlanta won the SIAC Eastern Division Championship, then won three straight games to take the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) Tournament championship and advance to the NCAA Division II South Regional, where they lost to Florida Southern College. For his efforts, Jordan was named the SIAC Coach of the Year and HBCU National Coach of the Year by BOXTOROW.




Jordan is a Harlem, N.Y. native who earned his bachelor's degree in business administration, with a concentration in marketing from Clark Atlanta. He played point guard for the Panthers from 2006-09. Prior to starting as a head coach, Jordan served eight seasons as an assistant at his alma mater, and was part of three Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship teams, including the regular season championships in 2009-2010 and the SIAC tournament champions in 2011 and 2017. During his last two seasons at Clark Atlanta, Jordan served as the recruiting coordinator. During that time, the Panthers went 45-18 with back-to-back NCAA Division II tournament appearances.

He then followed former Clark Atlanta head coach Darrell Walter to serve for two years as an assistant coach at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. There Jordan recruited four-star guard Markquis Nowell and Ruot Monyyong, a top-50 JUCO recruit. Nowell and Monyyong earned 2019-20 first-team All-Sun Belt honors while helping lead the team to a 21-12 record and a regular season championship. Another Jordan recruit, Kamani Johnson, was named All-Sun Belt third team.

Most recently, Jordan was the associate head basketball coach at Morehouse for the 2021-2022 season. During his time at Morehouse, the team won the Eastern Division regular season championship and tied the school's longest winning streak (18 consecutive games).

He and his wife Cherokee, are the parents of son Alfred Jr., and daughter, Aria.



About The Clarence "Big House" Gaines Awards

The Clarence "Big House" Gaines College Basketball Coach of the Year Awards are presented to the head coach in NCAA Divisions 1 and 2, who may not earn recognition from mainstream outlets. An NSMA committee votes on the awards at the conclusion of the NCAA men's and women's tournaments.

Gaines was the head basketball coach at Winston-Salem (NC) State University for 47 seasons. His teams won 828 games, including the 1967 NCAA Division II National Championship. That team was led by Earl "The Pearl" Monroe, who went on to an NBA Hall of Fame career. Among other notable players Gaines coached were Cleo Hill, the first NBA first-round draft choice from a historically Black college or university, and sports media personality Stephen A. Smith. A former president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), Gaines was elected to the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1982. He died in 2005.

Kevin Harlan joined the CBS Television Network's NFL broadcast team as a play-by-play announcer in 1998, after four years of broadcasting the NFL on Fox Sports.

He also has called CBS Sports' coverage of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship since 1999, and called the NCAA Final Four and Championship game for CBS Radio Network and Westwood One for five consecutive years (2003-07), as well as the regionals (2009, 2010, 2011).

Harlan called CBS Sports' HDTV coverage of the 2001 AFC Championship and Super Bowl XXXV.

Harlan once again called play-by-play for "Monday Night Football" games teaming with Kurt Warner on Westwood One Radio Sports as the lead announce team, including all the playoffs, a Conference Championship game and the Super Bowl. In 2020, he called his 11th consecutive Super Bowl, surpassing a record held by former CBS Radio broadcaster Jack Buck. This upcoming NBA season marks his 35th season broadcasting the NBA. Harlan also has called play-by-play for Turner Sports' coverage of the NBA Playoffs since 1996. He has called regular-season action for TNT and TBS since the 1997-98 season and has served as play-by-play announcer for TBS's coverage of the 1998 Goodwill Games and several college football bowl games. For five seasons, Harlan broadcast NFL pre-season games for the Chicago Bears on WBBM-TV. He began broadcasting the Green Bay Packers' pre-season games in 2003 and will continue again this season. Harlan also called pre-season games for the Kansas City Chiefs, Jacksonville Jaguars, Washington Redskins and NFL Network. Harlan was voted the 2017 and 2019 National Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sports Media Association joining other CBS Sports broadcasters to win the award including Jim Nantz, Pat Summerall, Ray Scott and Chris Schenkel.

> Harlan was the original broadcast voice of the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves, calling their games for nine seasons on KFAN-AM Radio and KARE-TV. The Timberwolves honored him during the playoffs in May.

He has called NFL action for NBC Sports and college football for ESPN, as well as college football, college basketball and championship boxing for the Mutual Broadcasting System. In addition, Harlan has been the voice of the NBA's "2K" video games series since 2006, the last seven years with CBS Sports colleague Clark Kellogg as analyst.

> Harlan landed his first job, as the radio and television voice of the NBA's Kansas City Kings, at the age of 22. He called basketball broadcasts for the University of Kansas Jayhawks Radio Network (1983-84) and also spent nine seasons (1985-93) as the radio voice of the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs. In addition, he provided radio playby-play for the University of Missouri Football and Basketball Network (1986-89).

Passan is now a two-time winner of NSMA's National Sportswriter of the Year Award, having also won it in 2021.




sponsoring organizations vote on the award.

Born in Cincinnati and raised in Cleveland, Reis began his sportscasting career as a student at SIU's radio and television stations in 1975. While still a student, he began working part time at WCIL Radio in Carbondale, IL, and upon graduation in 1978, moved to full time there.



The Hickok Belt[®] Award was conceived as a way to honor Ray and Alan Hickok's father, Stephen Rae Hickok, an avid sportsman and the entrepreneurial innovator behind the Hickok Manufacturing Company, in Rochester, NY, once the largest and most respected maker of men's belts and accessories in the world.

The ultimate sports prize, the Hickok Belt[®] was awarded annually from 1950-1976 to the top professional athlete of all sports, as voted on by a panel of 300 sportswriters.
